Our Community Languages Program offers students an opportunity to engage in language acquisition and cultural activities which further enriches their understanding of our multicultural school. The Creative Arts program is also exceptionally strong at our school including; a music program K-6 facilitated by a professional music teacher; dance and drama programs, where students engage in performances internally and externally. Other programs such as our 'clubs' session also focus on student welfare and personal development, as part of our commitment in the education of the whole child for life in the 21st century.

The first day of school can be a daunting experience, whether starting as a Kindergarten student, or as a student transferring from another school. We attempt to minimise any negative aspects of this transition by having programs in place to assist new students to familiarise themselves with their environment, make friends and optimise their time at school. Parents are encouraged to participate in the life of the school through formal meetings and parent workshops and activities provided by our Community Hub. We also actively encourage parents to help in the classroom and on the sporting field, as well as joining us at special celebrations and assemblies.

School Overview

Fairfield West Public School is a safe and pleasant setting where skilled staff work with respectful students. The student population is over 700 with a culture that is enriched by 90% of students coming from a language background other than English and 26% from refugee families. The school has a strong focus on academic achievement and prides itself on a positive learning environment.

All classes are equipped with interactive whiteboards and air conditioners. Other facilities include a modern air- conditioned hall with sophisticated sound and lighting; a fully equipped library; a well-run canteen, a basketball court; three covered learning areas and extensive grassed areas for students to enjoy.

Our purpose is to provide a 21st century learning environment through facilitating engaging experiences and programs relevant to the individual needs of our students. Special emphasis is placed upon Literacy, Numeracy and Information Communication Technology. Students are supported in their learning through Support and Learning Assistance; English as a Second Language/Dialect; Intensive English New Arrivals programs and Gifted and Talented programs.

Our school provides several community language programs including Arabic, Assyrian and Vietnamese.

Our Support Unit, which consists of 7 classes, caters for students with special needs in an integrated nurturing environment.

Fairfield West Public School offers an extensive sports program, which includes the development of Fundamental Movement Skills and weekly participation in the Primary Schools Sports Association program. Our students also have the opportunity to be professionally coached in dance, swimming and tennis.





Enrolment

We can help you with your enrolment enquiries anytime throughout the year.

Your child can start Kindergarten at the beginning of the school year if they turn five on or before 31 July in that year. By law, all children must be enrolled in school by their sixth birthday.

If your child is currently enrolled in a NSW public school, contact us to discuss the enrolment procedures and obtain the necessary paperwork.



If your child is coming from a non-government school, contact us to make an appointment to discuss your child's potential enrolment.

If your child has a temporary visa or visitor visa, you will first need to apply to enrol by contacting the temporary residents' program who will give you forms to bring to the school.

Enrolment appointments

If your child has not been previously enrolled in a NSW public school, you will need to bring these documents with you:

- your child's birth certificate or identity documents
- proof of student's address originals of different documents such as your council rates notice or residential lease and electricity bill
- Immunisation history statement based on the Australian Childhood Immunisation Register (ACIR)
- family law or other relevant court orders (if applicable).

If your child is not a permanent resident you will also need to provide:

- passport or travel documents
- current visa and previous visas (if applicable).

For children already enrolled in a NSW public school we only require:

- proof of student's address originals of different documents such as your council rates notice or residential lease and electricity bill
- family law or other relevant court orders (if applicable).

It's important that you tell the principal if your child has any special circumstances, allergies, health or medical conditions, before your child starts school.

You will be asked to complete an application to enrol in a NSW public school form and return it to us. We will notify you of the result of your application. Please note that this form must be completed in English.

Kindergarten Information

WELCOME! We hope the kindergarten year will be a happy and enjoyable experience for you and your child. Kindergarten is your child's first year at school. It is a year when school routines are established and your child explores, plays and makes friends.

The program we provide builds on your child's experiences at home. The teachers provide experiences for your child to learn social and academic skills through play and active involvement with other children and adults.

Here is a sample of skills suitable for most children starting Kindergarten. Encourage your child to attempt these things but don't worry if your child can't do all of them.

Language and Literacy

- Talks to other people about familiar objects and events
- Asks and answers simple questions
- Makes needs known
- Follows simple instructions
- Uses books for enjoyment or for looking at pictures
- Uses a variety of things to draw, such as pens, pencils, paint brushes and textas

Numeracy

- · Recognises that numbers can be used to count
- Uses words like 'all, many, a lot, more and less'
- Identifies things in a group that are different
- Sees differences in shapes
- Differentiates between opposites, such as up and down, under and over

Personal and Social Skills

- Uses the toilet independently
- Can say own name and address
- Adapts to unfamiliar settings and new experiences
- Can finish a task and tidies up afterwards
- Plays cooperatively with other children-shares and takes turns
- Can sit still to listen to a story
- Is curious about the world
- Participates in imaginative play
- Joins in singing and dancing to familiar songs

Physical Skills

- Uses scissors to cut along a line
- Enjoys a variety of indoor and outdoor play
- Can put on and take off own clothing
- Ties own shoe laces





What parents can do to help their child prepare for school

- Visit your school with your child.
- · Be positive about school and learning.
- Talk with your child about going to school.
- Use your local library.
- Read to your child talk about what may happen next in a story.
- Share many different experiences.
- Support your child in your home language while learning English.
- Read to your child in your home language.
- Provide a variety of play materials, such as water, sand, paper, pens, paint and balls.

Kindergarten Transition

Our school has a Transition To Big School program in place called Kindergarten Transition. Parents need to enrol their child at the school office during Term 3 for inclusion in the program. Kindergarten Transition is a valuable learning experience for children's readiness for school. We encourage all children to attend.

Classes

Fairfield West Public School is committed to ensuring high quality educational outcomes for all students in a nurturing and supportive environment.


Individual learning needs of all students in every classroom are catered for via the delivery of differentiated curriculum.

Through Local Schools Local Decisions, the principal further supports the educational needs of students by forming smaller class sizes and employing additional specialised teachers in the classroom.

School Learning Support Officers, SLSOs are also employed to maximise the opportunity for learning.

Students are able to participate in a number of extra-

curricular and specialised groups and clubs to further enhance their whole school experience.



Support Unit Classes

The school now has 7 specialist Support classes. They include 1 IO class, 1 IM class 2 Autism classes and three IO and Autism classes. All classes provide students with specialised support that caters for individual needs. Teachers are trained to identify and meet the needs of specific students through the development and implementation of individualised programs. They are assisted by full time SLSOs who undertake ongoing training to best support student needs in the classroom.



Composite Classes

Every year the school forms composite classes. At the beginning of the school year, many parents will find their child in a composite class. Naturally, questions arise: for the older group: Will my child be held back? For the younger group - Will my child be able to keep up? The key to understanding composites is realising that growth is determined by stages and not by ages. Even within the same class, students will be at different levels. Teachers recognise this and will extend the work of those who learn more quickly and give more attention to those who require greater assistance.

Job Sharing

We also have staff job sharing some programs and classes. Job sharing is an arrangement in which two or more people share one full-time job. The two teachers work together to perform the full range of tasks within a single position. There is no division of duties and instead the two teachers are interchangeable, with either member of the team able to pick up where the other left off. This arrangement requires the highest level of communication and coordination and is implemented carefully so as not to disrupt our students. We match teachers very well, and we put in place strategies so that teachers work, communicate and manage to the best of their abilities.

Team Teaching

Staff also participate in team teaching. This occurs with mainstream and support staff teachers or teacher mentors. Team teaching benefits students in that there are two experts to learn from; one teacher may teach the whole class or larger group, while the other may assist individual students; and the teachers work well with each other, sharing expertise and reflecting on their teaching practices.



Library

Students in all classes visit the school library once a week. During this time, students are engaged in literacy based activities and are given the opportunity to borrow one of the many quality texts available.

A library bag must be used when borrowing books from the library.

Students also have the opportunity to visit the library at lunchtime to read and relax.

Premier's Reading Challenge

Each year all students in Kindergarten to year 6 have the opportunity to participate in the Premier's Reading Challenge. To complete the challenge, students are required to read, or be read, a set number of books over a 12 month period, beginning in March each year. Students completing the challenge receive a certificate signed by the Premier of NSW in term Four.














Healthy Eating

The Front Office

The Front Office consists of our Administration Office, the Principal's Office, the two Deputy Principals' Offices.

All visitors to the school are asked to report to the office in order to sign in and be given a 'Visitor' badge to wear.



Money Collection

All payments for school excursions or sporting activities are processed through the Front Office. A money collection slot is located at the outer door of the front office. All money needs to be placed in an envelope and clearly marked with your child's name and class, as well as what the payment is for. Eftpos is also an option. Receipts will be issued to students via the class teacher.



It is absolutely essential that we are able to contact you at any time. Please ensure the office has an up-to-date contact number for you at all times. Please list the contact details for an emergency contact person. Ensure that this person is aware that the school may contact them.

Health Care Plans

All staff at Fairfield West Public School undertake First Aid, Emergency Resuscitation and Anaphylaxis Training every year. Our students' health and wellbeing is of primary importance to us. Each student, who has a medically recognised illness, condition or allergy has an Individual Health Care Card. This card is attached to each of the playground folders and a copy is given to the class teacher to be kept in the classroom. The Health Care Card outlines the student's condition, symptoms and signs to look out for and lists what to do in the case of an emergency.

It is vital that the school is kept informed of any medical concerns or changes to conditions or medications as quickly as possible so that we may properly care for our students.

Medications

Some of our students suffer from an allergy or require specific medications. The Front Office stores these medications in a safe environment where they may be accessed as necessary. Parents are asked to provide the office with a doctor's note outlining the medications and dosage their child requires. **Students cannot self-administer medicines.** It is a parent's responsibility to ensure that medications are replenished as necessary.





Accidents and Illnesses

Minor accidents and illnesses inevitably happen at school. Our school Administrative Officers are well trained on how to deal with such events. In the event of an accident or illness, the following procedures take place:

- For minor illness or injury, first aid will be administered as necessary at the sick bay and the student then returns to class with an explanatory note for parents.
- If an illness or injury is more serious, parents will be notified that further treatment is required and parents will be contacted with a request to take the student home.
- In cases of serious illness or injury, an ambulance will be called and parents will be notified immediately.

Attendance & Absences

One of the Premier's priorities for 2020 is to 'bump up education results' for children. In order to do this, your child needs to be at school every day.

Attendance is recorded each day. **If your child is late to school**, you must visit the Front Office in order to have the partial absence recorded. A late note will be issued to give to the classroom teacher.

If you need to pick your child up from school before 3pm, you must visit the Front Office in order to request an early leaver's note. Your child will then be called to meet you in the office.

As a parent or caregiver you are responsible for ensuring your child attends school every day, including sports days unless your child:



- has an unavoidable medical or dental appointment (preferably these should be made after school or during holidays);
- is required to attend a recognised religious holiday;
- is required to attend an exceptional or urgent family circumstance (such as attending a funeral);
- · is sick, or has an infectious illness.

If you are having difficulty getting your child to attend school regularly, you might like to talk to your child's Classroom Teacher as first point of contact.

If it is necessary for your child to be absent from school for any reason, including arriving late or leaving early, please either tell your child's teacher or the Administration Assistant at our school, or explain the reason by phone, email, or written note as soon as possible, or within seven days. Alternatively, absences can be logged via the Skool bag App.

Students who have not been collected from their classroom by 3:10pm will be taken up to the Front Office. Parents will be called to collect their child. If you know you will be late picking your child up for any reason, please contact the school on 9604 5568.

ICT

Information, Communication and Technology

Fairfield West Public School provides students with technology skills and tools to support their learning as 21st Century learners.

Each stage has a set of 5 iPads to use in classes. These iPads are used to incorporate technology into planned lessons, across different areas of the curriculum.



Coding and Robotics

We have class sets of Dot and Dash, Ozobots and Lego WeDo 2.0 robots that are regularly borrowed throughout the school. Classroom teachers provide students with an engaging approach to coding and robotics to help them develop fundamental skills of collaboration, problem-solving, and persistence through hands-on activities that enhance lessons in all subjects.

Interactive Whiteboards

Each classroom at Fairfield West Public School features an Interactive Whiteboard. Teachers and students use these daily. Interactive Whiteboards are a fun, interesting and interactive way for students to be actively involved in their learning.

Classroom Computers

Each classroom also has computers for independent and small group student tasks. We also have a set of portable laptops that teachers can borrow for their in-class teaching and learning programs.

Languages

Fairfield West Public School offers a number of Community Languages, including Arabic, Assyrian and Vietnamese.

Students in Years 1- 6 take part in Language lessons for 120 minutes each week.

Interpreting Services

At Fairfield West, we want every parent to feel like a part of the school. We offer Interpreter services in Arabic, Assyrian and Vietnamese.

Language Teachers attend parent meetings to translate for parents and caregivers who feel more comfortable in their native language.

Scripture

Scripture lessons are offered once a week, for 40 minutes. At Fairfield West, we offer classes in three religions: Catholic, Protestant and Islam. Representatives from each religious group take students from each grade to complete religious studies.

Parents who do not wish their child to participate in Scripture lessons can choose to have their child remain in class for a Values Education lesson.

Sport

Fitness

Students at Fairfield West are encouraged to be fit and healthy. Teachers and students participate in Fitness activities, designed to get our hearts pumping and our adrenalin racing in order to keep our minds and bodies active for learning.

K-2 Sport

Students in Kindergarten, Year 1 and Year 2 participate in Sport each week. Students are taught different fundamental movement skills, such as running, throwing, kicking and catching. These games and activities support their social and skill development.



Learn to Swim

At Fairfield West, we offer students in every grade the opportunity to participate in weekly swimming lessons with qualified swimming instructors. These lessons usually take place in Terms 2 and 3. These lessons are designed to teach swimming survival skills. The students are grouped according to their swimming ability and take part in lessons designed to build on and improve their swimming skills.

PSSA

Fairfield West Public School offers students the opportunity to participate in a variety of sports as part of the Horsley Zone PSSA Sporting competition. Summer sports (Terms 1 & 4) such as Newcombe ball (girls), Cricket (boys), T-Ball (girls & boys), Softball (girls & boys), AFL (girls) and Touch (girls & boys) are available for the students to play.



In Winter (Terms 2 & 3), students can play Netball (girls), Basketball (girls & boys), Soccer (girls & boys), AFL (boys) or Rugby League (boys).

Students who make a PSSA team are required to attend training sessions during the week (at lunch time) and then participate in a game against another school on a Friday.

Swimming and Tennis

Students who prefer non-competitive sports can choose to participate in Recreational Swimming or Tennis lessons. Students in Years 3-6 are given the opportunity to participate in Recreational Swimming and Tennis during sport time on a Friday.

Recreational Swimming is offered during the Summer season (Terms 1 & 4) and teachers supervise and participate with the students in the water.



Tennis lessons take place at a local tennis centre and students are given an hour lesson by qualified tennis instructors.

School Sport

Students in years 3-6 who do not participate in PSSA, Dance Company, or attend Swimming or Tennis for sport on Friday are involved in school sport at school. Students are placed in House teams and compete against each other in a variety of sporting games and activities. House Points are tallied and accumulate over the term.

Carnivals and House Groups

Fairfield West Public School students participate in three annual carnivals throughout the year. In term 1, students aged 8 and over may be able to participate in the School Swimming Carnival, provided they have passed the Aquatic Survival Challenge. This challenge is held at a local leisure centre the previous year, in order to see which students have the necessary swimming skills to be able to compete.

In term 2, the school holds its Cross Country Carnival, with students aged 8 and over competing. In term 2 or 3, we hold our annual K-6 Athletics Carnival with students competing in a number of sprint races, as well as Long Jump, High Jump, Shot Put and Discus.



In order to build whole school relationships and cooperation each student is a part of a House Group. These House Groups are known as Thorpe (blue), Freeman (red), Sauvage (green) and O'Neill (yellow). At the carnivals the students compete for two trophies, the Spirit Cup, for participation and team spirit; and the Overall Championship Trophy, awarded for place points. Also, depending on the success of the students at each of the carnivals, they may then earn higher representation at Zone, Region or even State level.

Fairfield West Public School offers a range of Creative Arts programs and clubs for students to choose from throughout the year. Students are offered the opportunity to engage in a range of performances at school, such as Showcase and International Day and in regional concerts.

All students are given a whole-class music lesson once a week for two terms by a music specialist through our music support program.

Students sing and play a wide range of musical instruments This program has an emphasis on performance skills.



Leadership / SRC

The Fairfield West Public School Student Representative Council (SRC) is formed at the beginning of each school year. Every class is represented by two students who are nominated and voted for by their peers. These representatives are sworn in at an official induction ceremony.

The SRC begin the year by identifying issues which directly impact students' time at school. They meet on a fortnightly basis to discuss and brainstorm ways of addressing them.

Furthermore, the SRC assist with school fundraising and awareness campaigns throughout the year.

Public Speaking

During the year students may be involved in different Public Speaking competitions. Our school enters the Multicultural Public Speaking competition involving students in years 3-6.

Students from Kindergarten to Year 6 also participate in the Fairfield District Competition where they have the opportunity to compete against students from other schools within the district.

Throughout the year all students participate in talking and listening activities in class and are involved in class or grade public speaking competitions.

Debating

Fairfield West enters two teams into the NSW Premier's Debating Challenge. Students in years 5 and 6 are selected to participate this state-wide, round robin competition. The competition consists of students debating a range of topics and students compete against other schools in their zone.

Specialised Programs

Aboriginal Education

At Fairfield West Public School, we are proud of our Indigenous heritage and celebrate Aboriginal culture and history in a variety of ways, such as recognising important annual events including National Reconciliation and NAIDOC week. The whole school is involved in activities that focus on learning about Australia's history and Aboriginal cultures, customs and beliefs. We also ensure that appropriate Acknowledgements of Country protocols are met at the beginning of all formal gatherings, such as school assemblies.

The school also actively plans and sets aside funds linked to learning outcomes to develop effective Personalised Learning Plans for all Indigenous students.

English As An Additional Language/Dialect - EALD

EALD support is given to classes throughout the school. EALD teachers can work with the classroom teacher or with small groups of students to develop and consolidate students' use of the English language.

Learning and Support Teachers – LAST/ Interventionists

At Fairfield West PS we have Learning and Support Teachers (LASTs) who visit classrooms to assist students who are having difficulties with their learning. LASTs may support students in class, or withdraw them for more individualised learning. LASTs may also support the classroom teacher to cater for students with additional needs.

New Arrivals Program

New Arrivals Program

In 2020, at Fairfield West Public School, there are currently two New Arrivals Program (NAP) classes. These classes have been formed to provide intensive language support to students who have just arrived from overseas with minimal or no proficiency in the English language. One class is funded by the Department of Education whilst the other has been established by the school under the Local Schools Local Decisions initiative. Students engaged in this program are provided with opportunities to develop their English language skills.



Links to High School

Middle Schooling

Fairfield West Public School works closely with the nearby high schools, Westfields Sports High School, Fairvale High School and Fairfield High School, and runs an in-school transition to high school program called 'Middle Schooling' with Stage 3 students. Middle Schooling gives students the opportunity to experience learning as a high school student where classes run for 40 minute periods, once a week, during Term 4. Students learn to read a timetable, experience a variety of subjects taught by different teachers and move classes several times a day.

High School Program

Fairfield West Public School liaises with teachers from Westfields Sports High and Fairvale High School to give students experiences in Science, English, Mathematics, Humanities and Sport classes at the high school. These classes help students to become accustomed to high school expectations.

An SLSO from Westfields Sports High also attends FWPS one day a week to work with groups of students, supporting Literacy and Numeracy skills and preparing our students for high school.

Year 6 students attending other high schools also have opportunities to attend orientation programs run by teachers at their nominated high school.

Dance Company

Dance Company is a program offered at Fairfield West Public School for students who wish to participate in extra curricula studies of dance. Focusing on the creative arts syllabus and safe dance practices, students can engage in and learn various forms of dance. While participating in Dance Company students build their understanding of performing, composing, appreciating and can engage with the elements of dance.

Additionally, Dance Company provides students with an outlet to express themselves creatively and emotionally. Students who do not dance outside of school are offered opportunities to express themselves in a fun and safe environment. Students also have the opportunity to build different skill sets and the chance to experience what it is like to work cooperatively in a group setting and perform at a professional level such as Ultimo Dance Festival.



Parents - How can you get involved in your child's education?

Helping out at school is a great way to get involved in your child's education and to get to know the school staff and other parents.
