Principal's Address

In Term 4, staff at Fairfield West PS continued to enact our combined moral purpose to 'Fuel the hearts and minds of all students' underpinned by 'The Best Me' model of behaviour. Students were placed in the centre of all decision making resulting in an excellent year of learning and growth academically, socially, and emotionally. Further evidenced in the following pages by being acknowledged by ACARA as having outstanding NAPLAN results.

The state's high-achieving NAPLAN schools for 2024 revealed

When Fairfield West Public School principal Genelle Goldfinch walks around the playground on the first day of term, she asks her students how they spent their holidays. Their responses typically do not include visits to the beach or other Sydney landmarks.

More than 90 per cent of Fairfield West Public students have a language background other than English, while about a third of those enrolled are refugees.

Until this year, some of her students had never seen the ocean, despite the fact it's only an hour's drive away. "Even the children who were born in Australia have not always been to the beach," she said.

While trips to the coast might seem unrelated to reading and writing skills, Goldfinch said those experiences were critical for developing background knowledge – a core factor in comprehension.

The primary school, where two-thirds of students are in the lowest socio-educational quartile, rolled out a "building background knowledge" program this year. This involves students taking once-a-term excursions to different parts of Sydney, including to beaches, the Art Gallery of NSW and the zoo.

"How can students infer what the sand might feel like if the sun's been on it all day, when they've never even touched the sand or been to the beach?"

Fairfield West Public is among 53 schools across NSW identified by the Australian Curriculum, Assessment and Reporting Authority this year as high-achieving in their 2024 NAPLAN results.

The selected schools have above-average scores in reading, writing, spelling, grammar and numeracy – across every year group tested – when compared with students of similar socioeducational backgrounds.

This year's NAPLAN results will be released on the MySchool website on Wednesday, along with individual school attendance and enrolment figures.

National and statewide NAPLAN results, released in August, showed one in three students in NSW performed below expectations in the literacy and numeracy exams.

At Fairfield West, Goldfinch lists myriad factors behind the school's success, including explicit teaching of reading and maths and ensuring teachers constantly evaluate their own performance.

"I say 'if you all agree with me, well, I may as well be in the room by myself'. I encourage rigorous debate and discussion and the teachers and leaders work extremely hard," she said. "That's why we get the results, because of their moral purpose, they're driven to make that difference for the children."

The school, which achieved well-above average scores in all domains tested, provides breakfast five days a week and treats behaviour management as a classroom priority. "The students are comfortable. They want to be here," she said.

"We're not this or that. We are one as Fairfield West public school to do the best. We try and get the kids to move forward. And we're proud of being here."

Bee The Best Me

To support students in achieving The Best Me model of behaviour, the school now has a mascot, the "Bee The Best Me" bee comes to school every day, never gives up and cares. From 2025 the bee will make appearances at assemblies and other school events.







Support Unit End of Year Review

Brodie from K-6A attended the Koori Cultural Day at Westfields Sports High School. He enjoyed learning about his Koori culture. He loved participating in the hands-on activities such as painting their own indigenous artwork, learning traditional dances and using sticks to produce music. Brodie's favourite activity of the day was playing cricket with some of the players from Sydney Thunder.

In Term 4, each class participated in the hands-on interactive Healthy Harold lesson. The educators from Healthy Harold spoke to our students about how to recognise safe and unsafe environments, people we can go to for help and how to be safe on the internet. The students put this into practice through role play.

The students in K-6C, K-6G and K-6P have been learning about money this term. The classes created opportunities for students to 'purchase' a product of their choice including toys from the toy shop or a ride at Luna Park. The students enjoyed putting their knowledge of money into practice.







Our students have continued to enjoy the Fit Futures sessions where they have been practising their dribbling and kicking skills. They then use these skills in a friendly game of modified soccer.

As the year comes to an end, we prepare to farewell our Year 6 students. Some of these students have been with us since Kindergarten, while others have joined us over the years. While at FWPS, Nohra, Yousif, Norman, Karmen, Isho and Preston have made many friends and have enjoyed the different learning experiences that they have engaged in. This term, they have enjoyed learning the Year 6 dance for the farewell and attending transition sessions at the high school they will be going to in 2025. We wish Nohra, Yousif, Norman, Karmen, Isho and Preston all the best at high school.

Support Unit End of Year Review

This has been a very exciting term as the students in the Support Unit continue to be 'The Best Me'! We welcomed a new student, Khaldoon, into K-6G.

In Term 4, many of the students attended the excursion to Sea Life Sydney Aquarium. This was a fantastic opportunity for the students to see the aquatic animals that they had been learning about in RFF.





The students also enjoyed celebrating Halloween. They learnt about the celebration and then dressed up and went Trick-or-Treating. The students were excited to experience Trick-or-Treating with their friends. There were lots of smiles and laughter as they knocked on the classroom doors and received small treats from the staff. This was a great way for students to practise their social skills.





Kindergarten End of Year Review

It's hard to believe that Kindergarten students have completed their first year of school. From learning to recognise letters and sounds to confidently writing their names and simple sentences, each child has blossomed in their own unique way.

In literacy, many students have achieved significant goals, such as recognising all the letters of the alphabet and their corresponding sounds. Many are now able to read simple stories independently and express their thoughts through oral storytelling and their writing.

In numeracy, students have made impressive strides in counting, with many able to count confidently beyond 30. They have also mastered basic addition and subtraction concepts, using hands-on activities to solve problems. Students have explored patterns, shapes, and measurement, laying a solid foundation for future mathematical concepts.

It has been wonderful to see the students develop essential social skills as they formed friendships throughout the year. They have learned to share, take turns, and communicate effectively with their peers, creating a supportive and caring classroom environment. These interactions have fostered teamwork and cooperation, allowing students to celebrate each other's successes and navigate challenges together.

Kindergarten End of Year Review

This year, the students had the opportunity to embark on some fantastic excursions that enriched their learning experiences.

Their visit to the Auburn Botanic Gardens allowed them to explore people in places, where they learned about different plants and animals, and their habitats. The trip to the farm was a highlight, as students interacted with various animals and gained a deeper understanding of living things. They enjoyed the tractor ride and milking the cow! Finally, the theatre show outing sparked creativity and imagination, inspiring many of the young learners to express themselves through storytelling and drama.

The Kindergarten teachers are incredibly proud of all the students and their accomplishments this year.

Kindergarten Excursion to Auburn Botanic Gardens

Kindergarten students enjoyed an exciting outing to Auburn Botanic Gardens to investigate the importance of different places to people and living things.

Throughout the day, students interacted with stunning outdoor environments, comparing the natural spaces to the places they call home. They examined a variety of ecosystems, including wetlands, water lagoons and bushland, gaining a deeper understanding of the diverse habitats that exist around us.

One of the highlights of the excursion was building animal habitats using natural materials they found in the environment. This hands-on experience allowed students to explore the characteristics and needs of various living things whilst also working on their creativity and teamwork skills.










Stage One End of Year Review

Stage One students have had a fantastic final term of 2024! Here's a glimpse into some of the highlights:










In English, Year 1 students explored the structure of narratives using the text Tilly. They explored perspective and argument through the sustainability-focused text The Mess That We Made. Students also enjoyed reading Giraffes Can't Dance to further learn about how good writers create interesting characters in picture books.

Year 2 students delved deeper into narratives through reading and analysing The Uncorker of Ocean Bottles and The Heart and the Bottle. Students really enjoyed listening to the short stories in The World's Worst Children and built their understanding of how characters are represented by authors. Finally, Year 2 learned more about perspective and argument using the text The Gentle Genius of Trees.







Stage One End of Year Review

Stage One students have made incredible progress in their mathematical understanding. Many students are becoming more confident mathematicians who can clearly explain their reasoning. Some of the topics students explored this term included representing whole numbers, combining and separating quantities, forming groups, 2D shapes, 3D objects, area, volume, length and mass.







In science, students continued to study the physical world this term by looking at how different sounds can be made.

In geography, Stage One learners continued to explore people and places and enjoyed creating maps of our school and our local area.

In PDH, students investigated the inquiry question 'How do I keep myself and others safe?'. They learned about practical ways to keep safe and healthy every day. For PE, they enjoyed their fortnightly Fit Futures sport sessions on the back oval. as well as fundamental movement skill lessons with their class.

Stage Two End of Year Review

The term has seen a lot of growth in our Stage Two students, especially compared to where they started at the beginning of 2024.

In English, the students explored narrative, imagery, symbol and connotation through the books Our Dreaming and 200 Minutes of Danger. They also explored theme, argument and authority through the books Kicking Goals with Goodesy and Magic and Survivors: Inspiring True Stories of Survival.

In mathematics, the students explored a range of big ideas:

- that our number system extends infinitely to very large and very small numbers.
- that multiplicative thinking involves flexible use of multiplication and division concepts, strategies and representations.
- that fractions represent multiple ideas and can be represented in different ways.
- that questions can be asked and answered by collecting and interpreting data
- that angles are the primary structural component of many shapes.





In Science, the students investigated why and how the Earth's surface changes over time. Students recognised and developed questions that could be investigated scientifically and undertook independent and collaborative investigations.

In Creative Arts, Year Three attended drumming lessons with Mr Jarrah where they improved their understanding of rhythm and beat. The students also worked on a range of class artworks.

Stage Two End of Year Review

In Geography, the Stage Two students explored the climate, natural vegetation and native animals of places in Australia and Asia. They examined the importance of natural vegetation and natural resources to the environment, animals and people and learnt about the ways people value environments, including Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander Peoples. Students identified sustainable practices and recognised that there are differing views on how sustainability can be achieved.

The students were lucky to work with the Fit Futures team on developing their movement skills this term as well as participating in Friday sport. Our Year 4 students improved their soccer skills through the Sporting Skills program.

At Healthy Harold, the Year 3 students learnt to broaden and develop emotional literacy, identify and practise assertive communication skills, practise emotional skills such regulation as mindful breathing and develop skills for building positive relationships with friends. The Year 4 students learnt to keep personal information safe online. how recognise, react and report unwanted and potential predatory behaviours, how to exercise responsible and respectful behaviour when using communication technology and the role of bystanders.







Stage Three End of Year Review

This term has been exciting and enriching for our Year 5 students!
In Sporting Schools, students learned how to play soccer, developing their skills and teamwork.





During our Healthy Harold session on "Relate, Respect, Connect," students gained valuable life skills for building healthy relationships.

In literacy, the focus was on imagery and symbolism, enhancing students' reading and writing abilities. Students also prepared and delivered leadership speeches, building confidence and creativity in expressing their ideas. In mathematics, the focus was on multiplication and division, and students have shown significant improvement in their results.

Some students participated in an Academic Challenge, blending cooking and literacy skills while collaborating as a team. Additionally, Aunty Lynn shared captivating Aboriginal stories, teaching students about dreaming stories and song lines.



Overall, this term has provided valuable learning experiences, and we look forward to more exciting activities next year!

Stage Three End of Year Review

As Term 4 ends, we are thrilled to share the incredible experiences our Year 6 students have participated in. This term has been filled with a lot of learning and fun as students get ready for high school.





This term students had a lot of opportunities to showcase their sporting skills. Students enjoyed a trip to Fairvale High School, where they participated in various sports activities led by high school students. This experience helped them improve their athletic skills whilst also teaching them about the importance of teamwork and sportsmanship. Additionally, every two weeks, students took part in the Fit Futures program, where they learnt different sport skills.

Year 6 also had a visit from Healthy Harold, who taught students the importance of making better choices for their health.

To prepare our Year 6 Students for High School, once a week students participated in middle schooling. This experience gave students a glimpse into what life will be like in high school, carrying their bags around and moving to different classes for each subject. Students had a blast!








Middle Schooling











Year 6 Middle schooling is a school program designed to help students smoothly transition into high school. In this initiative, students work closely with teachers like Mr. Ottmann, Mr. Hormis, Ms. Borra, Ms. Le, and Ms. Linnegar, learning subjects such as ancient history, personal development (PD), mathematics, art and science. Aboriginal Language Program

One of the key highlights this term was the students' engagement with learning to read the Acknowledgement of Country in Dharug. This important practice not only fosters a greater appreciation for the land we are on but also strengthens the connection to the traditional custodians of the area, the Cabrogal Clan of the Darug Nation. Students took pride in mastering the pronunciation and meaning of the words, enhancing their cultural awareness and respect for Aboriginal heritage.

Additionally, students had the opportunity to participate in weaving activities, where they explored traditional Aboriginal techniques. Under the guidance of Aunty Lynn, they learned to create beautiful woven baskets using natural materials. This hands-on experience allowed them to connect with Aboriginal culture in a meaningful way while developing fine motor skills and creativity.







We look forward to more exciting opportunities for cultural learning and connection next year.

Koori Culture Day

On Wednesday 20 November, our Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander students attended the AECG Koori Culture Day at Westfields Sports High School. This special event brought together students and their siblings from different schools, allowing our students to connect with their peers and learn more about their culture.

The day began with a cultural performance, where our students enjoyed traditional songs and dances. This was followed by a smoking ceremony, which is an important practice that represents cleansing and protection. Our students participated in this ceremony with great respect.



















After the ceremony, the students took part in a variety of fun rotational activities. They played cricket, practising their skills with diving catches. They also engaged in a cultural lesson, where they listened to traditional stories and learned to use sticks to play along with music.

Following a delicious sausage sizzle lunch, students participated in traditional dance and dot painting workshops. These activities allowed them to express their creativity and gain a deeper understanding of Aboriginal art.

Overall, students had a fantastic time engaging in the activities and making new friends!

Sydney Aquarium Excursion

On Tuesday 5 November, Stage 1 and some Support Unit students attended the Sydney Aquarium excursion. Students had an amazing time exploring the aquarium and learning about many different sea animals. They were fascinated to see huge sharks and stingrays and had the opportunity to learn about two types of shark eggs and hold them. Students loved seeing penguins, starfish, jellyfish, dugongs, eels and many marine creatures. Overall, it was a fun filled day with lots of learning and adventure!













Stage Two Excursion Reports

During Term 4, Stage 2 were finally able to attend our excursion to the Royal National Park at Wattamolla. Our first attempt in Term 3 had to be postponed due to unfavourable weather conditions. After our long bus ride we met with our guides who then took us through the National Park on one of the walking tracks. On our walk we investigated the different types of rocks that are found in the area and discussed how they are weathered and then eroded. We learnt about sandstone which is a particular type of rock that is found a lot in Sydney. Along our walk we also stopped to measure the air temperature, wind speed and wind direction. We also talked about how scientists use this information to study our Earth. We took in the amazing views of the coastline, taking a close look at the weathered cliff faces. While taking some time to eat our lunch and enjoy the views, some of us saw whales that were playing in the water. Our guide explained that the whales were migrating down the coast. Overall, we had a great day out in nature with spectacular views.







During Term 4, Stage 2 visited Narrabeen Beach as part of our study of weathering and erosion. It was a very long bus ride, but very worthwhile. When we arrived we met our guides who took us down to the Narrabeen coastline. Once we got there we divided into our class groups, each having a turn at different activities. We experienced some time on the sand and experimented with creating our own beach to help us learn about how beaches are formed and eroded. Part of this task was that we also had to build a seawall to protect a home that had been built along the coastline. We also took on the role of scientists as we calculated the air temperature, wind speed and wind direction. Later we had great fun at the rockpools where we divided into small groups with our teachers and our guides and looked at some of the amazing marine life of the area. We saw crabs, sea lettuce and sea snails to name a few! After, we started our journey back to school. It was a fairly quiet bus ride back as everyone was very tired from a great day out at the beach!
