External validation is an external process that provides an assurance to the school and the system that the progress being made aligns with the expectations outlined in the School Excellence Framework.


FWPS had external validation on 25 June 2024. The school validated as Excelling in all areas as outlined below.

KINDERGARTEN IN TERM 2


Students in Kindergarten this term have had a lot of fun engaging in a range of hands-on, learning activities in and out of the classroom.








In maths, students are focusing on representing numbers from 1-20 and learning that numbers are made up of smaller quantities. KB students are learning how to tell time on analogue and digital clocks.





In English, students have been learning the sounds of the alphabet and they have started to apply these sounds to read decodable texts and write CVC words. In writing, students have looked at a range of texts like When Billy Was a Dog, The Very Hungry Caterpillar and Feathers for Phoebe. Students are learning to write a simple sentence independently and some have started to publish their written work. Look at all this marvellous writing! We are very proud of them.


KINDERGARTEN IN TERM 2

In History, students are learning about their families and how there are different types of families.

In Creative Arts, students are enthusiastically participating in music lessons with Mr Jarrah. Look at some enthusiastic KL students learning how to play the drums.









In Science, students are learning about the 5 senses and how they can use them to describe different materials and objects. In KA, students used their 5 senses to describe what popcorn feels like, looks like, sounds like, smells like and tastes like. Most students would agree that eating the popcorn was their favourite part of the lesson!

Students have enjoyed participating in grade fitness as well as sports lessons with Fit Futures. This term, we focussed on the skills of throwing, catching and kicking. KR really enjoy working together during cooperative games.

STAGE 1 IN TERM 2

As we reflect on the term, we are thrilled to share the exciting learning experiences our Stage One students have been immersed in. Here's a glimpse into some of the highlights!

In English, our Stage One learners explored the way objects, events and ideas are represented in narrative texts through books, including The Wall in the Middle of the Book, Rosie's Walk, Scaly-tailed Possum, Echidna and Nian and the Chinese New Year Dragon. Students also deepened their understanding of context by exploring how the language and form of texts varies according to purpose through books, such as Great White Shark. In addition, students developed an understanding of how authors describe characters through The Gruffalo, The Good Egg, Spoon, The Lion and The Mouse and The Tortoise and the Hare.



In mathematics, our enthusiastic Stage One learners have been engaging in activities and problem solving tasks to build a strong foundation in mathematical concepts, including:

- identifying different combinations of numbers and recognising what the equals sign means
- collecting and organising categorical data
- describing the lengths of objects
- using different strategies, such as counting on and counting back, to work out the total when combining and separating quantities
- using mathematical tools, such as an equal-arm balance, to determine the mass of a collection
- giving, describing, and comparing the position of objects using positional language
- using repeated addition to solve multiplication problems.
- interpreting simple maps by identifying objects in different locations

STAGE 1 IN TERM 2

In history, Stage One students have investigated the differences in family structures and roles today and how these have changed or remained the same over time. Students also investigated changes and continuities in family life and identified similarities and differences between their family and others.

In science, our Stage One students been eagerly exploring the have fascinating world of materials around us. Through hands-on activities and experiments, engaging they have delved into the properties and uses of various substances. We look forward to further discoveries exciting and experiments next term.

In visual art, students have been experimenting with various techniques. Drawing inspiration from renowned artists and the beauty of nature, our students have created stunning pieces that reflect their unique perspectives. We can't wait to start working on our artwork for the annual art exhibition!

Like last term, all Stage One students have been developing their movement skills in Fit Futures every fortnight. Year Two students have also been participating in Sporting Schools this term. Sporting Schools visited to teach students athletics skills. All Stage One students have participated in all these sporting lessons with enthusiasm.



STAGE 2 IN TERM 2

The term has been filled with non-stop learning for our Year Three and Four students.

In English, the students explored argument and authority through the books Wandi and Ned Kelly and the Green Sash. They also explored imagery, symbol, connotation and characterisation through the books Piano Fingers, Sonam and the Silence, Bindi and Fire.

In mathematics, the students explored a range of big ideas:

- that our number system extends infinitely to very large and very small numbers.
- that multiplicative thinking involves flexible use of multiplication and division concepts, strategies and representations.
- that visual representation helps us to understand aspects of our world (chance and position).
- that what needs to be measured determines the unit of measurement.
- that angles are the primary structural component of many shapes.

In History, the Stage Two students explored the historical features and diversity of their community. They examined local, state and national symbols and emblems of significance, and celebrations and commemorations, both locally and in other places around the world.

In Science, the students examined the survival of living things as well as food and fibre production.

In Creative Arts, it was Year Three's turn to go to Mr Jarrah for drumming lessons where they improved their understanding of rhythm and beat. The students were also busy working on their artworks for the Art Exhibition in Term 3.

The students were lucky to work with the Fit Futures team on developing their movement skills this term as well as participating in Friday sport and the cross country carnival.

STAGE 3 IN TERM 2

The term has been filled with non-stop learning for our Year Five and Six students.

In English, the students explored argument and authority through the books One Island and Rabbit, Soldier, Angel Thief. They also explored imagery, symbol, connotation and characterisation through the books Spotlight and Rabbit, Soldier, Angel Thief. The students participated in The Multicultural Perspectives Public Speaking Competition.

In mathematics, the students explored a range of big ideas:

- that our number system extends infinitely to very large and very small numbers.
- that addition and subtraction problems can be solved by using a variety of strategies.
- that what needs to be measured determines the unit of measurement.
- that fractions represent multiple ideas and can be represented in different ways.
- that questions can be asked and answered by collecting and interpreting data.



STAGE 3 IN TERM 2

In History, the Stage 3 students explored Australia as a Nation. Students learned about the causes and effects of change on Australian society including key figures and events that led to Australia's Federation.

In Science, the students looked at Material World and how properties of a range of materials work. Students investigated the different properties of solids, liquids, and gases, and considered combining and separating mixtures.

In Creative Arts, it was the Year 5 students' turn to go to Mr Jarrah for drumming lessons where they improved their understanding of rhythm and beat. The students were also busy working on their artworks for the Art Exhibition in Term 3.

The students were lucky to work with the Fit Futures team on developing their movement skills this term as well as participating in Friday sport and using the play equipment.



SUPPORT UNIT IN TERM 2

The students in the Support Unit have had a great term. K-6A welcomed Emily to their class this term. All of the students have had lots of fun learning new concepts across all key learning areas. Over the term, the students also enjoyed participating in the K-2 Cross Country, Fit Futures sporting lessons, Ballet Without Borders and drumming lessons with Mr Jarrah.







Other highlights of Term 2 included, K-6B going on the excursion to Featherdale Wildlife Park to see in person some of the Australian animals that they had been learning about.





SUPPORT UNIT IN TERM 2

Students in K-6J attended the Responsible Pet incursion. This program discussed and modelled dog safety and how to stay safe around dogs. The students role played how to be safe when a dog is scared, nervous and excited.









Each class also acknowledged National Sorry Day and National Reconciliation Week by creating artworks that are proudly displayed in the classrooms. Lots of discussions and hands on activities were provided to engage the students.





SUPPORT UNIT IN TERM 2

Some students from the Support Unit enjoyed the opportunity to participate in weekly Ballet Without Borders ballet lessons where they were taught and practised basic ballet movements. Chloe, Sidney, Brodie and Mariam from K-6A enjoyed the opportunity to attend the NSW School Sport Unit Boccia Competition. They had lots of fun competing against other primary schools and representing Fairfield West Public School.



K-2 CROSS COUNTRY

On Thursday 23 May, K-2 students participated in the annual Cross Country event, which was held on the back oval at school. Students participated enthusiastically in the race and there was a remarkable display of determination and school spirit. Thank you to the parents for their support and encouragement in cheering the students on as they ran around the course. Congratulations to all the students for trying their best.







ACADEMIC CHALLENGE

A small group of Year 5 students represented Fairfield West PS at the Academic Challenge at Fairfield High School in Week 5 where they against other competed neighbouring primary schools. students completed challenges in the areas of mathematics and PDHPE. They showed enthusiasm and active participation and were rewarded with 1st place for the day.





RESPONSIBLE PET INCURSION

K-2 and some Support Unit students participated in the Responsible Pet Education Program on Wednesday, 15 May. Students were excited to meet the dog that visited with the presenter. The program was highly engaging, teaching students how to behave safely around dogs. Students also learnt how to say hello to dogs with their owners. Some lucky students were also selected to demonstrate how we pat a dog by walking up slowly, making a stop, asking the owner, letting the dog smell your hand and stroking gently.



Throughout the day, students enjoyed interacting with various farm animals and watching different shows, including petting the goats, milking the cow and watching


sheep being rounded up and shorn.

ATTENDANCE & ABSENCES

Attending school every day allows your child to get the most out of their learning and improve their career and life options.

Regular school attendance can help expand your child's learning and create positive relationships with their peers.

Attendance is recorded each day, including partial absences for arriving late or leaving early. Your child must come to the office.

If your child is late to school, you must visit the Front Office in order to explain the partial absence.

If you need to pick your child up from school before 3pm, you must visit the Front Office in order to request an early leaver's note. Students can only be picked up by an authorised adult (must be 18 years old or over) listed, or someone prearranged by the parent/carer.

If your child is absent for a full day, please contact the Front Office to explain the absence or reply to the text sent via School Bytes. All absences need a reason given within seven days. The school has processes in place to contact parents regarding absences.

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
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
